
Dear Padre,

If the Catholic Church recognizes baptisms from other Christian denominations, why not confirmations?

Baptism signs us with an indelible mark. It defines our character and can never be repeated. A baptism is always held to be valid if a person is baptized with water using the Trinitarian formula (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1256). If a priest is unsure of the validity of a person's baptism, he would baptize the person conditionally, recognizing the earlier baptism if it happened and was valid. The minister of baptism is usually an ordained minister, but in necessity anyone can baptize, including a non-Christian, if the person intends what the Church intends.



different from baptism is that the minister of confirmation is ordinarily the bishop because this expresses the apostolic unity of the Church (CCC 1312). If someone had been confirmed in a Church that has apostolic succession,

their confirmation would be considered valid, and the person wouldn't be reconfirmed.

here are moments when we realize the baton has been passed to us, and now we must conduct the symphony of our lives. One such moment may be when both parents have died. "They" say we never fully grow up until that occurs, for from that time on we can no longer go home. I know of a daughter who received a gift from her mother when the daughter moved out on her own. Inside, the daughter discovered a pair of apron strings, a symbol of her break with home. At various times, life hands us a bountiful serving of responsibility as we commit to a vocation, or for many, become parents for the first time. On such occasions, the future may weigh heavily upon us.

This week's Gospel is a farewell speech of sorts. Given to the Twelve on the night before his passion and death, Jesus promises he will not leave us orphans and that the Spirit will be given to us to do what we must do.

There have been any number of times when life has unfolded for me into new circumstances and life roles, occasions often filled with anxiety and sometimes even fear. I usually found I could deal with such realities by asking myself what would be the worst that could happen, and if it did, could I handle it? Every time, I found myself realizing I could handle the worst. Importantly, the ability to do what needs doing always seems to flow from God's Spirit that is given to each of us. If our faith in God is alive in us, our spiritual apron strings are never severed.

From Fr. Tom,

For most of the 19th and 20th centuries, the Catholic Church relied very heavily upon its parochial school system for the teaching and spreading of the faith. Most schools were jammed packed with students, many having siblings in different grades. I remember a family that had 10 or 11 children and I asked the father what grades they were in, and he answered, "Pick one!" I also remember as a child in St. Francis of Assisi grade school in Oakville, almost every one of my classmates went to church. We would see each other at school and also at church. That's just the way it was. Sadly, this is not the case anymore. The church cannot rely upon its school system like it used to for the spreading of the faith because the majority of families with children in parochial schools do not attend church. They won't miss a ball game, but they will miss church (editorial comment there). So what do we do? We must be like Philip in our first reading today proclaiming Christ with great success. The apostles experienced great things while teaching about the risen Christ and there is no reason why we can't do the same. The 21st century has seen some remarkable advancements in science and technology, particularly in information sharing and instant access to data. Wouldn't it be equally wonderful to see such an exponential increase in faith and awareness of God? Great things happen when that happens. It's up to us!


